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HOMEOWNERS

1. Political literature may be given to the Site Manager who will place it in the rack outside of the Office. It will be removed after 5 days. (Existing rules applying to displays in other areas are described in Regulation 8.)
2. Homeowners may personally distribute political literature directly to Unit mail slots.
3. Partisan political meetings sponsored by homeowners may be held in the Social Room, subject to all existing regulations relating to the private use of that room. (See Regulation 2.)
4. Homeowners holding political gatherings in their own Units should remind guests to honor Association policies regarding the display and distribution of literature in the building.
5. The Association and its committees may sponsor *non-partisan* programs in the Social Room.

CAMPAIGNERS

Minnesota law (211B.20) requires that candidates, and the campaign workers who accompany them, be given access to the building. It is possible, however, to limit access by the following means:

- (a) Homeowners should not “buzz in” anyone who calls from the lobby claiming to be a candidate or a campaign worker. (S)he should be admitted to the building only after a homeowner has personally inspected an ID.
- (b) Literature may be given to the Site Manager who will place it in the rack outside of the Office. The literature will be removed after 5 days.
- (c) Campaigners must not be permitted to distribute literature throughout the building by themselves. They should either be required to call the Site Manager for an appointment, at which time the Site Manager would accompany them around the building, or the homeowner who admits them might agree to accompany them. The literature should be placed in the Unit mail slots.
